
given so much for which we are THANKFUL!

MB3 has arranged for the Louisville Urban League to meet with the women of Dismas Charities-Diersen and begin the process of preparing them for employment once they are released. Interviewing skills, resume writing and actual employment interviews in the community help equip these women to join the work force and become independent. Thanks to Dr. Wylette T. Williams of the Louisville Urban League's Center for Workforce Development, and to Ronyal Horton, Director of Dismas Charities-Diersen, for helping make this happen. Employment is a key indicator of a successful re-entry process.
